
Number of spliffs of ganja smoked :

Among ganja users in 2012 (n=841), 8.0% reported smoking less than 1 spliff, followed by 4.0% that reported smoking 4 or more spliffs in the past month.

A notable proportion of students (6.9%)reported having used less than 1 spliff of ganja every day, followed by 1.9% of students that reported having about 1 spliff daily.

Age of first use:

The 2012 CISDUS noted that among those reporting ever using ganja (n=841), the average age of first use was 13 years.

About 12.3% of users reported an "early onset" of use; that is they first used ganja between the ages of 6 and 11 years.

In 2010 and 2012 the average age of first use was 13 years.

TRENDS IN GANJA USE BY STUDENTS IN THE CAYMAN ISLANDS 1998-2012








Ganja Prevalence 2012:

- In 2012, 14.6% of students surveyed smoked ganja at least once in the year prior to the survey and 13.9% smoked during the past month.
- Males (15.4%) were more likely than females (14.2%) to use ganja in the last 12 months.
- Ganja use increased as grade level increased. There was variation among districts: Cayman Brac, West Bay and Bodden Town reported the highest prevalence in the Cayman Islands.

Change in Lifetime and Annual Use of Ganja 1998—2012.



- Lifetime: is defined as ever using the drug.
- Annual: is defined as using the drug during the past 12 months.
- Current: is defined as using the drug during the past 30 days.

Trends in Ganja Use:

Past year ganja use showed that the prevalence was significantly higher in 2012 (14.6%) compared to 1998 (6.6%).

Males showed a significant increase in use over time, as well as females.

Students from grade 10 and 12 showed a notably increase in ganja use since 1998.

All districts showed increases in ganja use in 2012 compared to the other years.



Source of obtaining Ganja and Place of Consumption:

The main source of ganja among the students surveyed was *friends*, followed by "*other sources*", *street dealers*, *other relatives* and *close family* members (parents/ brothers/sisters).


The most likely place students reported using ganja was at *friend's house*, followed by *in the neighbourhood*, at *home, other social events, school* and *sporting events*.


Usual Source of Ganja, by Gender 2012.



Perception of Availability:

In 2012, 32.3% of all students surveyed (39.6% of females and 36.0% of males) reported that it was "easy" or "very easy" to obtain ganja. It is notable the linear increase with grade, from 9.5% of 7th graders to 65.0% of 12^{th} graders.

Perception of Risk:

A quarter (24.5%) of surveyed students considered that a person who tries ganja once or twice, will have a slight risk of harm either physically or in other ways. More than one in every ten students (13.1%) considered that a person who tried ganja once or twice will have a great risk of harming themselves physically or in other ways.
